**Diwali** is a Hindu festival known as the Festival of Lights. It represents light over darkness and good over evil. Before Diwali, Hindus clean and decorate their homes. On Diwali, they give presents, watch fireworks, pray, wear their best outfits and have a feast.

**Advent** is the start of the Christian year. It begins on the Sunday nearest to the 30<sup>th</sup> November and is when Christians start to prepare for Christmas. It is a time for Christians to enjoy time with their families and friends. Churches may display an Advent crown or Advent wreath.



**Eid al-Fitr** is a Muslim festival which lasts for three days. It celebrates the end of Ramadan and is a time to think about others. Eid al-Fitr is celebrated in many different ways. Families might give gifts and cards, go to the mosque and even decorate their homes. Eid al-Fitr is a time when many Muslims give money to charity.



**Hanukkah** is the Jewish festival of light. It is also known as Chanukah. Hanukkah begins in December or late November and lasts for 8 days. A candle is lit each night. During Hanukkah, Jewish people eat special foods, give presents and play a game called Dreidel.
