foreword

Dear Parent/Carer,

Every year the Local Authority provides places in schools for children in the City of York. This guide has been put together to explain how we can help you through the school admissions process and to let you know what we do when you apply for a school place for your child and what we ask you to do.

Deciding on your preferred schools for your child is one of the most important decisions that you will make as a parent/carer. This guide contains some information about our schools and our services. We recommend that you visit schools on open evenings or make an appointment at a school prior to making an application.

As the numbers of children in York is higher than in many previous years, we are working hard to ensure the availability of places meets local need. However, we can not guarantee a place simply by living in the catchment area or already having a sibling in the school. Although we do prioritise applications from children living in the catchment area

and those with siblings already at a school, inevitably there are times when parental preferences do not equate to the number of available local places.

Please take the time to read this guide carefully and in particular, take note of the key information and the oversubscription criteria for the schools that you are interested in. It contains details of admissions policies and procedures and the rules that admissions authorities must follow. Reading this guide before making an application may prevent misunderstanding later. If after considering the information available here you need more information, please contact the School Services team who will be happy to assist you further.

I hope you find the information in this guide useful.

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a key information

Most of the information below is relevant to all applications, whether starting primary or infant school for the first time, transferring to junior or secondary school, or making an in-year application to change school, for example when moving into or across the York area.

If the information below is specific to a certain type of application, it will be clearly marked below.



Parental Responsibility

You can only submit an application for a school place if you have parental responsibility. If you share parental responsibility, you must be in agreement with others that also have parental

responsibility about the preferences and information submitted. Please ensure all parents have discussed and agreed preferences before making an application.

If we receive conflicting instructions for the same child we will not process the application any further at that point until we are provided with further evidence as to which parent's wishes should be accepted, for example a family court order. If a school has been allocated, the process for your child may be frozen.



Your Preferences

When you apply you can express up to five preferences, and rank them in the order you prefer. We strongly recommend that you use all five preferences and that you name your catchment school as one of these preferences. Should you not express a preference for your catchment school, a place will not be held there in reserve for your child.

We operate an equal preference system, which means that if you submit preferences for five schools, we consider each of these preferences separately on it's own merits according to the oversubscription criteria for that school.

We do not share the rank of your preferences with schools so they will not know, either before or after places have been allocated, who listed them as a first, second, third, fourth or fifth preference.

When we come to allocate places, if we could allocate you more than one of your preferences, the school allocated will be the school that you ranked highest. Any lower preferences we could have offered will be released and offered to other applicants.

Please note we will not come back to you to ask for further preferences, or to check the order of your preferences after you have submitted them.

For example, if School A has 30 places and 55 preferences (first, second, third, fourth and fifth), all preferences for School A will be ordered on a list from 1 to 55 according to School A's oversubscription criteria.

First, those in positions 1-30 on this list are allocated places and those from 31-55 placed on a waiting list.

This process is then repeated for Schools B, C and D. Some of those previously allocated School A have now been allocated places at School B as they named School B as a higher preference. Some of those on the waiting list for School A have been been allocated

Schools C and D and so are removed from the waiting list.

School A now only has 23 places allocated, with 7 spaces. The waiting list has also fallen from 25 to just 11. Those in positions 1-7 on this new shorter waiting list are allocated School A with those in positions 8-11 placed on a new waiting list for School A.

Once this process has been repeated several times for all schools, allocations have been finalised. It is then that we confirm allocations in writing to applicants, on National Offer Day. For inyear applications the process is similar although the numbers of places available is vastly reduced.

Expressing less than five preferences, or putting a school as your first and only preference does not give you a higher priority in being allocated a place at your preferred school.

If following this process we are unable to offer your child a place at any of your preferred schools, your child will be allocated a school that was not of your preference. This will usually be a place at the nearest alternative school with places available, though if this school in turn becomes full through allocating children in a similar position, the final school allocated may be some distance from

your home address. It may not be your catchment school if that school has filled up with preferences.

For example, if you submitted a first and only preference for School E, but you live in the catchment area of School F, you may not be allocated a place at either school if there are more applications than places available at both schools. You could be allocated School G which is some distance from your address.

We advise that you consider your preferences very carefully and rank all considered schools in your preferred order. Failure to name sufficient preferences in the hope of being allocated your first and only preference often leads to disappointment.



Change of Preference

If you decide after submitting your application that you would like to change the order of your preferences please contact us. If we can we will take these into account before allocations are made.

Preferences for schools that are voluntary aided, academies, or outside the York area, we may not be able to accept changes after the closing date for applications.

We cannot accept any changes for a primary or junior application after 15 March or a secondary application after 31 January.

Any changes received after we are able to process changes will be put aside and actioned after National Offer Day.



Catchment Areas

Each address in the City of York is located in the catchment area of one York primary school.

Most addresses in York are in the catchment area of one secondary school. The only exceptions to this are:

- the villages of Bishopthorpe and Acaster Malbis are in the catchment area of Fulford School, Millthorpe School, and Tadcaster Grammar School.
- the village of Copmanthorpe is in the catchment area of Millthorpe School and Tadcaster Grammar School.

Carr Infant School and Carr Junior School share the same catchment area, as do Bishopthorpe Infant School and Archbishop of York's CE Junior School.

Some schools such as church schools, including All Saints RC School and Manor

CE Academy do not have catchment areas. Details of all catchment areas are contained in the <u>Guide to School</u>
Catchment Areas.

When you express a preference for a school that is not your catchment school, your preference is considered under a lower priority than those who live in the catchment area (see <u>Section C</u> of this guide for more information on how preferences are prioritised).

We strongly recommend that you consider your catchment school and use one of your preferences for this school, even if it is your final preference. This is because if you are unsuccessful in being allocated all the schools you express a preference for, your child will be allocated a school that was not of your preference. We will then allocate a place at the nearest alternative school with places available.

A place is **not reserved** at your catchment school for your child.

If the place your child is allocated is at a school for which you are not in the catchment area for, or if you move out of the catchment area you now reside



in, then you may have less chance of being successful when applying for any younger siblings in future years.



We define siblings as brothers or sisters living in the same house as their primary place of residence. This includes half- and step- brothers or sisters at the same address, but does not include full-halfand step-brothers or sisters living at different addresses as their primary place of residence.

A sibling link is where your preference is considered under a higher priority for a school place than applicants who do not have a sibling who will be on roll at your preferred school at the time of admission. For most schools, siblings are considered after children who are resident in a school's catchment area and so will not always be successful in obtaining a place (see <u>Section C</u> of this guide for more information on how applications are prioritised).

Having children of similar ages at two different schools can be difficult. Some parent/carers find that they are successful in obtaining a place for their eldest child but are unsuccessful for their younger children in future years.

If you obtain a place for one of your children at a school, this does not mean that places can be guaranteed for their siblings either currently or at a later date. Exceptions, particularly infant class size exceptions cannot be made to admit siblings into a school if classes are full.

Please note that the 'sibling' criterion in the admissions policy for infant and junior schools does not apply to siblings who attend other nearby infant or junior schools, only to siblings at the same school at the time





of admission.

We measure distances from home to school on a GIS layer of all known safe walking routes within the York area. We measure these distances in miles to three decimal places from where your address joins this network to the closest school gate.

We take the shortest of all available routes and use this distance in ordering preferences where required.

We don't use roads without pavements or paths; routes through private property; and we don't use the ring road or other major routes where traffic can be at high speeds.

We can investigate and add in new routes where we are informed of routes that are adequately lit and paved. Please note any change arising from new information in this respect will not be

instantaneous changes as they must be visited, checked and then incorporated into the GIS layer.

Where a safe-walking route does not exist, we may measure along main roads including using maps from third-party mapping companies or where the distance measured is beyond our boundaries.



You may only use one address when making an application.

This must be the address at which the parent/carer and child are ordinarily resident at the time of application. We may check addresses against other records held by the City of York Council, in accordance with the authority's Data Protection Registration.

Addresses must be permanent addresses and be the same address when the child starts school. Addresses must not be those of relatives or temporary addresses such as staying with family or holiday accommodation.

Where there is joint residence, the address used should be the address at which the child is resident for the majority of the school week.

If this is evenly split, then parent/carers must jointly select one address and note only this address on the application, which will apply to all preferences. This address cannot then be changed later after an application has been submitted.

We are determined to prevent fraudulent applications for school places and will investigate any reported misuse of addresses by accessing our own records first, and if a false claim cannot be ruled out at this stage, we will pass all relevant information to our assurance partner Veritau to investigate further.



Veritau have access to all application details as well as any other records that may help them establish and verify the details that have been provided. They may undertake unannounced visits to addresses they believe may be connected to their investigation.

Following an investigation Veritau make a recommendation to the Local Authority as to whether the information was false or misleading, and the Local Authority or other admissions authority then makes a decision as to whether to withdraw the offer of a school place.

Where an offer of a school place has been made on the basis of fraudulent or intentionally misleading information which has effectively denied a place to a pupil with a stronger claim, the offer of a place will be withdrawn.

We retain the right to withdraw a school place at any time if an application is found to be fraudulent or intentionally misleading.



In 2016 and 2017 we investigated a number of false/fraudulent admissions applications – including some that resulted in the withdrawal of a place.



Change of Address

If you change your address after submitting your application, please send us the relevant proof of this change (see next page). If we can, we will take this new address into account before allocations are made. For preferences for schools that are voluntary aided, academies, or outside the York area, we may not be able to accept any address change after the closing date for applications.

We cannot accept any change for a primary or junior application after 15 March or a secondary application after 31 January.

Any changes received after we are able to process changes will be put aside and actioned after National Offer Day.



Proof of Residence

Where you use an address in an application, we may require further proof from you that your child is ordinarily resident at the stated address. We may request to see both entry and exit proofs when we query your address.

Entry proof will include, signed tenancies, posting orders, proof of exchange, and documents showing you have registered your property for the purposes of taxes, the electoral roll and with other relevant government agencies – for example your driving licence.

Exit proofs include any relevant documentation pertaining to the disposal of your previous address and include, for example, signed tenancies and proof of exchange. Additional information may be requested at any time.

We may also require satisfactory details of the ownership and tenancy of any previous addresses.

If we require any proof of residence, we will contact you to request it before we can continue with your application.

If you are already resident at an address, please provide some suitable proof such as a copy of the current financial year's council tax statement. When you apply online you have the opportunity to enter your Council Tax Reference for this purpose.

If you are moving to a new address and renting, please provide a signed copy of the tenancy agreement showing the length of the agreed tenancy. Short term tenancies may not be accepted.

If you are moving to a new address and purchasing a property, please provide a letter or email direct from your solicitor. This must be on exchange of contracts and include the date of completion.

If you are a member of the armed forces, and are subject to a posting or marching out order, please provide a copy of this order.

Places can only be allocated once proof of residence has been provided.

Please note that in the circumstances where you own one property, at which you previously lived, but are renting or proposing to rent another property, we will require detailed information and evidence regarding your intent and circumstances.



Currently and Previously Looked After Children

If your child is 'Looked After', that is in the care of a Local Authority, was previously Looked After, or has been adopted from care, your child may have a different priority in the <u>oversubscription</u> <u>criteria</u> for your preferred school. You will need to provide us with written proof of their status after applying. See <u>Section</u> D for more information.



Exceptional, Social and Medical Reasons

If you believe your child has an exceptional social or medical need that should be taken into account for one school, your child may have a different priority in the <u>oversubscription criteria</u> for your preferred school. You will need to provide us with written details after applying. See <u>Section D</u> for more information



Children with Special Educational Needs

Where children have a Statement of special educational need, or an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP), there is a different admission and appeals process. Decisions on places for these pupils will be discussed in Year 6. See Section F for more information.

Children who do not have a
Statement/Plan but may be on the SEN
Register or have My Support Plans with
some additional needs, may wish to seek
advice from the SENDCO at their child's
current school, but should apply by the
stated deadlines as for other applicants.
Please note it is highly unlikely that these
factors can be taken into account unless
an EHCP is held by your child.

You can apply for a school place at www.york.gov.uk/schooladmissions or if you don't have access to the internet, you can request and complete a paper form.

Applying for an 'In-Year' School Place

University Technical Colleges

Starting Year 12



Our policy states that infants will start full time education in the school year they turn five.

For entry in September 2018 school year, children will have been born between 01 September 2013 and 31 August 2014.

Children who were born between 01 September 2014 and 31 August 2015 can apply for a school place only from the Autumn of 2018.



Unless it is specifically included in a school's <u>oversubscription</u> <u>criteria</u>, attending a nursery or early years provider does not form any part of the

decision-making when allocating places at infant or primary schools, even if the nursery or provider is on the same site or within the school.



You can apply online at www.york.gov.uk/schooladmissions from 12 September 2018.

With an online application you will receive an email confirming submission of your application and the ability to view your application and results online at a later date. Please remember to submit your application by the closing date.

If you are applying for a place at a Voluntary Aided or Academy school, these schools may require you to complete a Supplementary Information Form (see next point on the right hand side of this page).

If you can't apply online you can request a paper Primary Application Form by calling 01904 551 554. Forms are also distributed to primary schools and nurseries in the York area.

You need to ensure that you have applied, either online (and submitted your application), or by returning a Primary Application Form by the deadline of 15 January 2018.



Please note that the 'sibling' criterion in the admissions policy for infant schools does not apply to siblings who attend a nearby junior school.

Supplementary Information Form for the
following schools if you are applying for a
place based upon your child's religion or
belief, or to provide any specific
information listed in their
oversubscription criteria that may apply
to your child.

- <u>St Lawrence's CE Primary School</u>
- St Wilfrid's RC Primary School

The additional information requested on these forms is required in order for these schools to apply their own oversubscription criteria.

Details of these criteria are available in <u>Section C</u> of this guide.



I have already completed a form at the school; do I need to apply to you?

Yes. Although you may have already completed a form at an individual school, these may only be registrations of

interest and will not be treated as a valid application.

You may have also provided information on a Supplementary Information Form to a Voluntary Aided or Academy school. If this is the case, you will still need to apply to your home local authority either online or by completing a paper application form.



Your home local authority is the local authority to whom you pay council tax. Locally this could be either City of York Council, North Yorkshire County Council (including district councils such as Selby,

Ryedale and Hambleton), or the <u>East Riding of Yorkshire Council</u>.

Only written confirmations or letters sent by your home local authority constitute the allocation of a school place.

We will start to process all applications on 15 January 2018 so if you do not apply by this date your application may be dealt with after all the other applications that were received on or before the application deadline. This means you will stand less chance of getting your preferred school, particularly if this is a voluntary aided or academy school, or a school outside the York area.

We strongly recommend that you express all five preferences and apply on time. We also recommend that one of your preferences is for your catchment school. In past years, parent/carers that

have failed to express a preference for their child's catchment school have been allocated another school that was in some cases, both not of their preference and significantly further from their home address.



National Offer Day is 16 April 2018.

Those applicants that applied online will receive emails from around 10am on the morning of 16 April. Other applicants will receive allocation letters in the post from 16 April. Those that applied online can view their account at

In July 2016 the government approved plans for a new primary school for York specialising in the creative arts. Although the Creative Arts Academy York originally planned to be open with a Reception class for September 2017, because of a delay in finding an appropriate site, York's first free school will now not open for Reception entry in 2018.

If your child attends an infant school you will need to apply for a place in a school from Year 3 - Year 6.

If you would like to apply for a place at a junior school from Year 3 you should do so by 15 January when your child is in Year 2.

Alternatively if you would like to apply for a primary school for your child from Year 3 to Year 6, you can make an <u>in-year</u> <u>application</u> for a primary school but only in June at the end of Year 2.



You can apply online at www.york.gov.uk/schooladmissions from 12 September 2017.

With an online application you will receive an email confirming submission of your application and the ability to view your application and results online at a





later date. Please remember to submit your application by the closing date.

If you have difficulty applying online, you can contact us on 01904 551 554 and we can talk you through how to apply. If you can't apply online you can request a paper Junior Application Form by calling 01904 551 554. Forms are also distributed to infant and junior schools in the York area.

You need to ensure that you have applied, either online (and submitted your application), or by returning a Junior Application Form by the deadline of 15 January 2018.



Please note that the 'sibling' criterion in the admissions policy for junior schools does not apply to siblings who attend a nearby infant school.



What happens if I don't apply on time?

We will start to process all applications on 15 January 2018 so if you do not apply by this date your application may be dealt with after all the other applications that were received on or before the application deadline. This means you will stand less chance of getting your preferred school and may be allocated one some distance from your address.



National Offer Day is 16 April 2018.

Those applicants that applied online will receive emails from around 10am on the morning of 16 April. Other applicants will receive allocation letters in the post from 16 April. Those that applied online can view their account at www.york.gov.uk/schooladmissions

School Services staff will be available on these open evenings to give independent advice on the admissions process for all schools. Please come and talk to us if you have any questions before making an application.



The transition between primary and secondary school can be difficult for some pupils. If you have any concerns about your child's transition, please contact your child's current headteacher who will liaise with your allocated secondary school to arrange the appropriate support.

After places have been allocated, primary schools provide your child's future

secondary school with information relevant to their progress and any additional educational or pastoral needs they may have.



Unless it is specifically included in a school's <u>oversubscription</u> <u>criteria</u>, attending a particular primary or junior school does not form any part of the

decision-making when allocating places at a secondary school.



You can apply online at www.york.gov.uk/schooladmissions from 12 September 2017.

With an online application you will receive an email confirming submission of your application and the ability to view your application and results online at a later date. Please remember to submit your application by the closing date.

If you have difficulty applying online, you can contact us on 01904 551 554 and we can talk you through how to apply. If you can't apply online you can request a paper Secondary Application Form.

You need to ensure that you have applied, either online (and submitted your application), or by returning a Secondary Application Form by the deadline of 31 October 2017.



You will need to complete a
Supplementary Information Form for the
following schools if you are applying for a
foundation place – that is one based
upon your child's religion or belief.

- All Saints RC School
- Archbishop Holgate's CE School
- Manor CE Academy

The additional information requested on these forms is required in order for these schools to apply their own oversubscription criteria. Details of these criteria are available in <u>Section C</u> of this guide.



No. Although voluntary aided and academy schools schools may set their own oversubscription criteria, their admissions are still locally coordinated and so you still need to apply to your home Local Authority. You may have also provided information on a Supplementary Information Form.

Only written confirmations or letters sent by your home local authority constitute the offer of a place. We will start to process all applications on 31 October 2017 so if you do not apply by this date your application may be dealt with after all the other applications that were received on or before the application deadline. This means you will stand less chance of getting your preferred school, particularly if this is a voluntary aided or academy school, or a school outside the York area.

We strongly recommend that you express all five preferences and apply on time.

We also recommend that one of your preferences is for your catchment school. In past years, for a small number of applications, parent/carers that have failed to express a preference for their child's catchment school have been allocated another school that was in some cases, both not of their preference and significantly further from their home address.



National Offer Day is 01 March 2018. Those applicants that applied online will receive emails from 10am on the morning of 01 March.

Other applicants will receive allocation letters in the post from 01 March. Those

If you are moving into or across the York area, or you are simply requesting a change of school, we call this type of school admission – an in-year school admission.

We are unable to hold places open for any in-year applications. Schools often fill up to their published admission number when places are first allocated.



Applications to start after or received after 31 December for Reception, Year 3 (at junior schools), and Year 7 will be treated as in-year applications.

If your child is moving school due to your relocation you may not be able to predict the date you will require a new school place in advance due to securing a new address. However, if you are requesting a change of school within York, it is best to request a change of school with an intended start date at the beginning of a new term or half term.

Requests for a change of school in Year 10, Year 11 or in the second half of Year 6 can be incredibly disruptive to your child's education. We would recommend that if at all possible you would not

request a change of school at these times, as it may significantly affect your child's education at a time of study and preparation for end of key stage exams or tests.

We coordinate all requests for in-year admissions, however if your request is for a school for which we are not the admissions authority – that is for a voluntary aided or academy school, then the decision made will be by that school itself and may therefore take longer than if your request is for a community or voluntary controlled school.

With an online application you will receive an email confirming submission of your application. Please remember to submit your application or we can't process it!

If you have difficulty applying online, you can contact us on 01904 551 554 and we can talk you through how to apply. If you can't apply online you can request a paper Application for a School Place. If you are requesting schools as you are moving away from York, complete an Application for a School Place (Out of Area).



Each year we process around 1200 in year admission requests. Around half of these are in the summer between June and September.

You can express a preference for up to five schools in your application. We recommend that you include five local schools as your higher preference schools may not have available places. Moving to an area does not mean there will automatically be a school place for your child at the closest, catchment or your most preferred school. If a school is full, no places will be allocated if a reasonable alternative may be offered.



We are unable to hold or allocate places in advance, but you should apply for a school place once you know you are moving address and know you will require one.

Any in-year request received may be processed if the required start date at a new school is within 20 school days. Please note if you apply in advance you will not be informed of your allocation exactly 20 school days before you intend to take up the place. We will start to process your application from this day,

and you will likely hear of which school your child has been allocated later in this period.

The only exceptions to the 20 school day rule are service families where we can allocate places upon receipt of a posting order, or in the case of service family rebasement, a marching out order, within 30 school days.



We cannot allocate places in advance as the availability of places, and the number of children applying for the place may change.

We aim to deal with all applications as quickly as possible, but please note that constraints such as school holidays, and requiring information from schools can significantly delay applications.



Considering your Application

The local authority or governing body, as the admissions authority for your preferred school(s), will consider your request in accordance with their set admissions policy.

When considering your application, we will have looked for a place for your child at each of your preference schools in turn. If we cannot allocate a place at your first preference school, we will then

investigate the availability of places at your second preference school, and so on.

If there is at least one available place, and there are several applications for the same school place, then applications will be ordered by the <u>oversubscription</u> <u>criteria</u> for the school. Different oversubscription criteria will apply for different schools if these schools are academy or voluntary aided schools. All of the oversubscription criteria for York schools are contained in <u>Section C</u> of this guide.

In the event that we cannot allocate a place at any of your preferred schools, we may offer you a place at an alternative school. This is often the closest school to your address with available places.

Should you wish to express preferences for schools that you did not originally apply for, you may do so by <u>putting this in writing to us</u>.



Refusals

In some cases we may not be able to offer a place at your preferred school(s), as the school(s) may be full in that class and/or year group, or the admission of another child may mean that the class

sizes are too large in future years. For children in the first three years of primary school, infant class size legislation may also prevent us offering a place at your preferred school(s).

Any refusal will be because the view of the admissions authority is that the admission of any further pupils to the school would prejudice the provision of efficient education and use of resources; that it would not be in the educational interests of your child, or the children already on roll, to be in such a large class.

We hold waiting lists where preferences have been unsuccessful should a place come up within that school year.

You can always <u>appeal</u> against a decision to refuse your child a school place.



Key Information for In-Year Applicants

We particularly recommend that you read the information in <u>Section A</u> of this guide prior to making an application. However, the main points you must consider now are detailed below:

 Catchment Areas – residence in the catchment area of any school does not guarantee the allocation of a school place at that school.

- Full year group and/or classes unless in very limited circumstances – such as your child being a looked after child – all applicants will be refused.
- Siblings if you have more than one child of school age, it may be more difficult to gain places for both/all children at the same school, particularly if a class or year group is oversubscribed.

Your child's level of attendance, behavioural history (for example any exclusions) and other issues may be considered in allocating your child an appropriate school.

Behaviour and Attendance

When you apply for a school place, we may check your child's attendance at their previous school(s), as well as their behavioural record. This is in line with our Fair Access Protocol so that children who would otherwise find it difficult to obtain a school place for these reasons can do so.

With our schools we have developed a Fair Access Protocol which aims to ensure that all pupils are allocated a school or alternative full-time education within 10 school days of submitting an application for a school place.

In consultation with other admission authorities within York, which include Voluntary Aided and Academy schools, we will attempt to meet one of the parent/carer's preferences.

University Technical Colleges

Children who are due to start Year 10 in September 2018 may also apply for a place at a <u>University Technical College</u> (UTC). UTCs are schools for 14–19 year olds that are set up by universities and businesses and specialise in one or two technical subjects. At GCSE they offer a similar curriculum to a typical 11-18 secondary school, including the basics of English and Maths, as well as their specialist subject.

Studio Schools are similar to UTCs in that they have employer involvement in the curriculum and focus on developing the skills needed for employment, involving personal coaching and work experience, alongside a similar curriculum to a typical 11-18 secondary school.

There are no UTCs in York, but students in Year 9 this school year may apply for a place at a UTC in a neighbouring area. If you wish to do this, we recommend that your child discusses their options with a Careers Adviser in their current school or

college, or <u>contact us</u>. Please note this is only an option available and this does not mean that you are required to move your child from their existing school if this is still the best option for them.

To apply for a place in Year 12 at one of these schools or colleges, you should contact the school or college and ask them how to apply. We do not coordinate admissions into Year 12, instead each school or college administer their own applications. Each school with

a sixth form has an admissions policy for external entry into Year 12 with oversubscription criteria that are available in <u>Section C</u> of this guide.

Please note if you are already on roll at a school with a sixth form, you will not have to apply in the same way for an external Year 12 place, but still must meet the requirements for continuing into Year 12 and make an application in Year 11.

C policies



Each school or admissions authority must have an admissions policy that details how applications for a place at that school should be made, how applications will be considered and how many places can be offered.

If there are more applications for places than places available, this policy must make clear who will be offered places and who will be refused. To determine this, applications have to be ordered according to a published set of criteria – these are known as the oversubscription criteria.

This section of the guide will detail the oversubscription criteria for each school or type of school and explain how places are allocated, and what happens if there are more applications than places available.

The full policies are not included in this guide. Instead they are published each

year and are available on our website at www.york.gov.uk/schooladmissions or upon request from the School Services team. You can also request a copy from voluntary aided and academy schools themselves.

We recommend that you consult these policies fully before applying for a school place.

The oversubscription criteria may not include other details that you should be aware of when making an application, such as deadlines or definitions of terms used in these polices.

If you are in any doubt about something you see in a policy and are unsure, please contact us.



The majority of schools in York are community or voluntary controlled

schools. These schools use the same <u>City</u> of York admissions policy which contains the same set of oversubscription criteria.

The admissions authority for these schools is the City of York Council – who are responsible for the admissions policy and makes all decisions regarding admission into these schools.

Places at these schools are allocated in the same way, regardless which community or voluntary controlled school you are applying for, according to the City of York admissions policy.



These schools have a different admissions policy which contains oversubscription criteria that may reflect the different faith or ethos of that school.

The admissions authority for these schools is the governing body or academy trust of the school – who are responsible for the admissions policy and makes all decisions regarding admission into these schools.

Places at these schools are therefore allocated in a different way, according to their own admissions policy. All policies for these schools are listed in this section of the guide.



Some schools that are now academies but were previously community or voluntary controlled schools, maintain admissions policies and oversubscription criteria that are very similar to those for community and voluntary controlled schools. These schools are:

- Badger Hill Primary
- Burton Green Primary
- Haxby Road Primary
- Hempland Primary
- Huntington Primary
- Knavesmire Primary
- Millthorpe
- Poppleton Ousebank Primary
- Robert Wilkinson Primary
- Scarcroft Primary

The admissions policies that apply for these schools are those of the academy trust that the school is now part of. These policies are summarised later in this section.



For those academies that have only recently converted from being a community and voluntary controlled school, the council's admissions policy still applies as these schools have yet to

be an academy when setting admissions arrangements for September 2018.

These schools are:

- Clifton with Rawcliffe Primary
- Park Grove Primary
- Tang Hall Primary
- Vale of York Academy

The community and voluntary controlled admissions policy will also apply to any community or voluntary controlled school that is expected to convert to become an academy during this school year.



Where an admissions policy below refers to children in public care, or 'looked after' children, the definition now includes children who were previously 'looked after' – that is adopted from local authority care.

If you are applying on the basis of your child being currently or previously looked after, you should ensure that the



appropriate proof is supplied to the admissions authority after making your application. See <u>Section D</u> in this guide for further information.



Oversubscription criteria are only applied where there is at least one available space. For this reason, the following criteria may not be applicable to 'in-year' applications if there are no available spaces, or if a different admissions policy applies for 'in-year' applications.



Some admissions policies and oversubscription criteria will be specific to a type of application, so each will be marked clearly in the following way:

- P Starting Primary School
- J Starting Junior School
- S Starting Secondary School
- Y12 Starting Year 12













The oversubscription criteria below apply to applications for those schools where the City of York Council is the admissions authority – that is all community and voluntary controlled primary, infant, junior and secondary schools within the City of York area, as well as any recently converted academies who have yet to formulate and properly consult on their own admissions policy.

It applies for applications:

- into Reception at primary and infant schools
- into Year 3 at junior schools
- into Year 7 at secondary schools

It does not apply for applications:

- into Year 12 at community or voluntary controlled schools with sixth forms these have separate admissions policies with similar oversubscription criteria that are listed later in this section
- for in-year applications and changes of school in other year groups availability here may be limited. The in-year admissions policy may be slightly different and can be viewed online.



Our Admissions Policy

Our criteria and admissions policy are designed to be as fair as possible while ensuring that resources are used sensibly.

Any school's resources, such as teachers and classrooms, have to be used carefully to ensure the best possible standards for education and a safe environment. If no limit were set on the number of children that can go to a school each year these standards could

not be maintained. Our criteria and admissions policy are based on where a child lives and the preferences of parent/carers.



Other Admissions Authorities With Similar Criteria

Other admissions authorities that wish to reflect these aims in their own admission arrangements for some of their schools, have adopted similar criteria. These academy trusts include:

- Ebor Academy Trust
- Hope Learning Trust
- Huntington Primary Academy Trust
- Pathfinder Multi Academy Trust
- South Bank Academy Trust

If in the future other community or voluntary controlled schools who convert to become academies, may choose to adopt an admissions policy and oversubscription criteria similar to those outlined here.



Infant Feeder Schools

For children applying for junior schools who attend an infant school nearby there is a separate criterion between the fifth and sixth priorities as set out below. It states:

Pupils who attend Year 2 at the named feeder school for the preferred school at the time of the closing date for applications. The closing date for applications is 15 January, and each junior school has only one named feeder school. For Archbishop of York's CE Junior School the named feeder school is Bishopthorpe Infant School. For Carr Junior School the named feeder school is Carr Infant School.



Catchment Areas

Each address in York will be linked to a school that normally serves their local area. Applicants are advised to consider this school, also known as their catchment school when making an application.



If the place your child is allocated is at a school which you are not in the catchment area for, or if you move out of the catchment area you now reside in, then you may have less chance of being successful when applying for any younger siblings, which could cause you difficulties in future years.

How Oversubscription Criteria Work

Where there are more applications than places available, each applicant has to be assigned a place on a list of applicants. That list is formulated by ordering each application according to the oversubscription criteria.

For example if there are 60 places, places will be offered to those who are in positions 1-60 on this list. Those in positions 61 onwards would be unsuccessful and placed on a waiting list for that school.

Where there are fewer places left than applicants in any one of the six priorities of our oversubscription criteria, places will be allocated to the applicant who also fulfils the next highest priority.

For example, for two children who are both resident in the catchment area and are thus assigned the same (third) priority, a place would be allocated first to the child who also fulfils the next highest priority, for example, who also has an exceptional social or medical need for that school (fourth priority) over a child living closer to the school (six priority).

Our Oversubscription Criteria in Priority Order

First priority: Children who are either currently or have previously been 'looked after'.

This applies to all children who are currently in the care of a local authority and all children who have been adopted from local authority care (subject to an adoption, residence or special guardianship order);

Second priority: Children who live within the catchment area normally served by the preferred school, with a sibling at the preferred school at the time of admission.

Catchment areas are designated by the Local Authority and are made available to parent/carers in the Guide to School Catchment Areas, online at www.york.gov.uk, and upon request from the School Services team. Siblings are defined as brothers or sisters living in the same house, as their primary place of residence (including half- and stepbrothers or sisters);

Third priority: Children who live within the catchment area normally served by the preferred school. Catchment areas are designated by the Local Authority and are made available to parent/carers in the Guide to School Catchment Areas, online at www.york.gov.uk, and upon request from the School Services team;

Fourth priority: Children considered by the admissions authority to have exceptional social or medical needs which relate to the preferred school. The admissions authority may consult with other medical or educational professionals for a further opinion as to whether the child should be allocated a place at the preferred school due to a particular medical condition or social need:

Fifth priority: Children with siblings at the preferred school at the time of admission. Siblings are defined as brothers or sisters living in the same house, as their primary place of residence (including half- and step-brothers or sisters);

> Sixth priority: Children who live closest to the preferred school using the nearest available safe walking route. Distances are measured by a GIS mapping system from the child's home address to

Oversubscription Criteria in priority order:

- 1. 'Looked after' and 'previously looked after' children from Catholic families.
- 2. Baptised Roman Catholic children whose home address is within 30 miles of the school.
- 3. Baptised Roman Catholic children whose parents are members of school staff who have been employed at the school for two or more years at the time of application.
- 4. Other baptised Roman Catholic children.
- 5. Other 'looked after' or 'previously looked after' children.
- 6. Catechumens.
- 7. Children with a brother, sister or eligible parent at the school at the time of proposed enrolment.
- 8. Children who are baptised or dedicated members of other Christian churches as recognised by Churches Together.
- 9. All other applicants.

Where the offer of places to applicants in any of the categories would lead to over subscription within that category, applicants will be prioritised in the following order:

- 1. Children who have a brother or sister at the school at the time of proposed enrolment.
- 2. Children currently in receipt of Free School Meals or children who have been in receipt of Free School Meals in the last six years.
- 3. Children with one or more parents that are in the armed services.
- 4. Those with the shortest safe walking route from their home to school.

- 5. Children with a brother, sister or eligible parent at the school at the time of proposed enrolment.
- Children who are baptised or dedicated members of other Christian churches as 6. recognised by Churches Together.
- Children who are baptised of other Christian denominations whose baptism is 7. recognised by the Catholic church.
- 8. All other applicants.

Where the offer of places to applicants in any of the categories would lead to over subscription within that category, applicants will be prioritised in the following order:

- Children who have a brother or sister at the school at the time of proposed 1. enrolment.
- Children currently in receipt of Free School Meals or children who have been in 2. receipt of Free School Meals in the last six years.
- 3. Children with one or more parents that are in the armed services.
- Children with an exceptional social, medical or pastoral need. 4.
- 5. Those with the shortest safe walking route from their home to school.





Supplementary Information Form required for Foundation applications. For Year 12 entry, please see the <u>Archbishop Holgate's Year 12</u> policy later in this section.

Applications are divided into two categories:

Foundation places are allocated on faith grounds to members of Christian churches and the other major world faiths. There will be up to 30% Foundation places available each year. If all Foundation places are not allocated, the remainder will become available for Community applicants.

Community places are for parents who live in the area normally served by the school and the wider community, and who want their child to attend a school with a Christian tradition. The remaining 70% will be Community places.



Looked after and previously looked after children:

A looked after child is a child who is either in the care of a Local Authority, or being provided with accommodation by a Local Authority. Previously looked after children are those who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order).



Foundation Oversubscription Criteria in priority order:

- 1. an applicant "at the heart of the church" (a member of an active worshipping family from which at least one parent/carer may be a close family member) is a regular worshipper. Within this category, the worshipper may be one or both parents/carers, or, provided the minimum threshold for consideration for a Foundation place is met, the child for whom the application is made.
- 2. an applicant "attached to the church" a regular but not frequent worshipper.



- 3. an applicant "known to the church" not a regular but an occasional worshipper.
- 4. An applicant attending less frequently than any of the above.

If there are more applicants for Foundation places within any given qualifying criterion than there are places remaining, the places for these applicants will be allocated to students whose homes are furthest away from their next nearest available Church of England secondary school, measured by the closest safe walking route. Any remaining applicants will automatically be considered for a Community place.

Archbishop Holgate's School welcomes applications from active worshipping families from other major world faiths (Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism and Sikhism), up to 10% of Foundation places will be available to those whose applications are supported by an appropriate reference.



Community Oversubscription Criteria in priority order:

Archbishop Holgate's School is committed to serving its local community and working in partnership with the Local Authority and neighbouring schools. The criteria below are based closely on the Local Authority's admissions policy.

1. students considered by the Governors to have exceptional social or medical needs specific to Archbishop Holgate's School.

Parents applying under this criterion are advised to consult the school in advance about its suitability for their child, and must provide professional supporting evidence, in writing, from a doctor, specialist health professional, or social worker, setting out the particular reasons why this school is the most suitable for the child, and the difficulties that would be caused if the child had to attend another school.

2. students who will have an older sibling attending Archbishop Holgate's School at the time of their proposed admission.

'Siblings' are defined as brothers or sisters living in the same house, as their primary place of residence, including half- and step-brothers or sisters.

3. students living in the area normally served by the school.

'The area normally served by the school' is the school's priority admissions (catchment) area as defined by the Local Authority and as set out in its Guide for Parents. 'Living in the area' is defined as the parent/guardian and child being ordinarily resident at an address in the area defined above. You may be asked for evidence of residence.

4. students with the closest safe walking route.

'The closest safe walking route' is defined as the distance from home to school as measured from the home address to the nearest entrance to the school site using the Local Authority's computerised measuring system.

If there are more applicants within any given qualifying criterion up to and including criterion 3 than there are places remaining, the places for these applicants will be allocated to the students with the closest safe walking route.

1. looked after and previously looked after children.

A looked after child is a child who is either in the care of a Local Authority, or being provided with accommodation by a Local Authority. Previously looked after children are those who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order).

2. students considered by the Governors to have exceptional social or medical needs specific to Archbishop Holgate's School.

Parents applying under this criterion are advised to consult the school in advance about its suitability for their child, and must provide professional supporting evidence, in writing, from a doctor, specialist health professional, or social worker, setting out the particular reasons why this school is the most suitable for the child, and the difficulties that would be caused if the child had to attend another school.

- 3. students meeting the criteria for a Foundation place
- 4. students living in the area normally served by the school.

'The area normally served by the school' is the school's priority admissions (catchment) area as defined by the Local Authority and as set out in its Guide for Parents. 'Living in the area' is defined as the parent/guardian and child being ordinarily resident at an address in the area defined above. You may be asked for evidence of residence.

5. students who will have an older sibling attending Archbishop Holgate's School at the time of their proposed admission.

'Siblings' are defined as brothers or sisters living in the same house, as their primary place of residence, including half- and step-brothers or sisters.

6. any other students

Second priority: Children who live within the catchment area normally served by the preferred school, with a sibling at the preferred school at the time of admission.

Catchment areas are designated by the Local Authority and are made available to parent/carers in the <u>Guide to School Catchment Areas</u>, online at www.york.gov.uk, and upon request from the School Services team. Siblings are defined as brothers or sisters living in the same house, as their primary place of residence (including half- and step-brothers or sisters);

Third priority: Children who live within the catchment area normally served by the preferred school. - 6. Students who live closest to Fulford School using the nearest available safe walking route. Distances are measured from the home address to the entrance of the school using the LA's GIS mapping system.

- 1. Children who are either currently or have previously been 'looked after'. This applies to all pupils who are currently in the care of a local authority and all pupils who have been adopted from local authority care (subject to an adoption, residence or special quardianship order);
- 2. Children with special medical or social circumstances affecting the child where these needs can only be met at this school. Professional supporting evidence from a professional, e.g. a doctor, psychologist or social worker, is essential if admission is to be made under the criterion for special medical or social circumstances, and such evidence must set out the particular reasons why the school in question is the most suitable school and the difficulties which would be caused if the child had to attend another school.



- 3. Children who will have an older sibling already at the school at the time of admission.
- 4. Children with a parent / guardian regularly involved in any of the local Christian places of worship within the ecclesiastical parish of Heworth Holy Trinity and St. Wulstan. (A map of the parish is available at school.)
- 5. Children whose place of residence is within the ecclesiastical parish of Heworth Holy Trinity and St. Wulstan. (A map of the parish is available at school.)
- 6. Children whose families are regularly involved in another Christian place of worship not within the ecclesiastical parish of Heworth Holy Trinity and St. Wulstan.
- 7. Children whose parent / guardian is an active member of other recognised faith communities
- 8. Other children

A letter from the parish priest or worship leader will be required to support applications under criteria 4, 6 or 7. If the admission number is reached mid-category, applications in that category will be prioritised on the distance from the child's ordinary place of residence to the main entrance of the school via the shortest safe walking route. Distances for this route are supplied to school by the Local Authority.

In <u>Section E</u> of this guide you will find schools contact details. You can also see all schools on the <u>map</u> at the back of this guide. You can also look at school websites, request a prospectus from the school, or view Ofsted reports.



When can my child start school?



Children born between 01 September 2013 and 31 August 2014 may start school full time in September 2018. However, you may opt to delay the entry of your child until later in the Reception year as long as your child is in school at the start of the school term after their child turns five. You may also ask your allocated school what part time education is available in your child's reception year. If you wish to delay entry, please speak to the head teacher of the school your child is allocated between Offer Day and the start of term in September.

If your child was summer born, that is born after 01 April 2014, you can request to defer their start date until Reception in September 2019 rather than September 2018. If you wish to do this, you should put this request in writing with your application by 15 January 2018.



When can I apply?







You can apply from September one year before your child would be due to start school. Secondary applications must be received by 31 October and Primary/Infant and Junior applications must be received by 15 January.



When can I apply?



You can apply up to 6 months prior to needing the place but we can only process in-year applications within 20 schools days of the date you tell us you require the place, unless you are a service family, in which case we may be able to allocate places earlier upon



receipt of a posting order. We are unable to 'reserve' or allocate places any further in advance.



How are places allocated?









Where there are more places available than requests, places will be offered to all applicants. Where there are more requests than places available, we will need to determine who is most entitled to these places. In this case, places are allocated under an equal preference system according to the <u>oversubscription criteria</u> for each school. These are available in <u>Section C</u> of this guide.



How many places are available?







How many places are intended to be offered each year is known as the published admission number (PAN). Information on the PAN for each school is contained within Section E of this guide. For some primary and infant schools, infant class size legislation may also mean that additional pupils above the PAN cannot legally be admitted.



How many places are available?



For in-year applications, the current number of pupils within each current class or year group will determine whether places are available. This may be higher or lower than the published admission number (PAN) as it depends on whether that class or year group can admit additional pupils without affecting the education of the pupils already enrolled. Availability of places therefore depends on current and future year's class organisation.



Infant Class Sizes: What does the limit on class sizes mean?





Legislation prevents class sizes in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 from exceeding 30 pupils per teacher. Admissions authorities must take this into account when allocating places.

You can still appeal if your child has not been allocated a place due to infant class size legislation, though the terms on which the appeal is held are different. Please see <u>Section</u> <u>F</u> of this guide for further information.



What is a Community School?











These are schools maintained by the Local Authority (LA), which in York is City of York Council. In a community school, the governing body manage and oversee the running of the school, including appointing staff and managing the school budget. The LA is the admissions authority for community schools, which means all decisions and policies are the LA's responsibility. The admissions policy for these schools is the same for all community and voluntary controlled schools.



What is a Voluntary Controlled School?











These are similar to community schools, although they were founded by other organisations such as a charity or church. The ethos of the school is likely to be influenced by the ideas of the organisation which founded it. In a VC school, the governing body manage and oversee the running of the school, including appointing staff and managing the school budget. The LA is the admissions authority for VC schools, which means all decisions and policies are our responsibility. The admissions policy for these schools is the same for all community and voluntary controlled schools.



What is a Voluntary Aided School?









Voluntary Aided (VA) schools were founded by other organisations such as a charity or church and are not fully maintained by the LA. The ethos of the school is likely to be influenced by the ideas of the organisation which founded it. In a VA school, the governing body have more power than those of VC or community schools – they employ all the staff and they share the maintenance of the school buildings with the LA. The governing body is the admissions authority for voluntary aided schools and the admissions policy is different for each school. The oversubscription criteria in these policies are available in Section C of this guide.













Academies are schools that are independent of the LA but are still publicly funded. Like voluntary aided schools, the governors or academy trust are the admissions authority and the admissions policy is different for each school. The oversubscription criteria in these policies are available in <u>Section C</u> of this guide.



What should I look for when considering schools?











We recommend all parents visit all schools they are applying for, including their catchment school, before making an application. Visiting a school is often a good way to get the feel of a school, and decide whether it should be one of your 5 preferences. Secondary schools hold open evenings, and primary schools may have times for parents to visit or will often show parent/carers around upon request. You may also want to consider the practicalities of getting to school in terms of distance or school policy and ethos towards behaviour, support, options and pupil progress.



Which school is my catchment school?











You can view <u>catchment areas online</u> or in the <u>Guide to School Catchment Areas</u>. You will only ever be in the catchment area for one primary school – and with the exception of Bishopthorpe and Copmanthorpe, only one secondary school.



Can I apply for a school outside York?











If you would like a place at a school outside York you still need to apply to us as your home local authority. We will then liaise with the appropriate area as part of our coordinated duties. Some areas within York may be in the catchment area for schools elsewhere. Please contact us if you are unsure if this applies to you.











If you live outside our boundary but you wish your child to attend a York school, you should apply to your home local authority.



Can my child be admitted to a higher or lower year group?









For a child to be admitted to a higher or lower year group there would usually be very significant educational and social reasons. It would often be the outcome of an ongoing dialogue between you and your child's school. Any request for starting secondary school early must be made in writing to the School Services team by 31 October when the child is in Year 5.



How do I apply for a child with special educational needs?











If you are applying on the grounds of your child having a Statement, or an Education, Health and Care Plan, you need to apply to the <u>Special Educational Needs team</u> or speak to the SENCO at your child's current school. If your child has some special educational needs but not a Statement/EHCP then your application should be through the mainstream process – in which case the admissions policy applied will not take account of your child's special educational needs. You can get further help and advice from SENDIASS.



How do I apply for a currently 'looked after' child?











If you are applying on the grounds of your child being currently 'looked after', you should ask your social worker to confirm this in writing to education@york.gov.uk after you have applied. Failure to provide this information may mean your application is not considered on this basis.













If you are applying on the grounds of your child being previously 'looked after' or now adopted, you should ask your social worker to confirm this in writing to education@york.gov.uk after you have applied. Being 'previously looked after' applies to all children adopted from local authority care. For further details please see Section C. Failure to provide this information may mean your application is not considered on this basis.



What exceptional social or medical reasons can be considered?











If you are applying with exceptional social or medical reasons you should forward separate supporting information to us after you have applied. All reasons should be for the preferred school and not against another school. If the school for which you have additional reasons for is a Voluntary Aided or Academy school, you should also forward the information to them for their consideration.

We recommend that this information is an independent recommendation from a doctor, social worker or other appropriate professional that states clearly to which school it applies and that this is the only school able to meet your child's needs for the reasons given – including what difficulties would result if your child had to attend another school.

For a reason to be classified as 'exceptional', the need would have to be where only one school could meet this need. As exceptional reasons cannot apply to more than one school you should not submit these reasons in more than one preference. If you do submit identical or similar reasons for more than one school you will in effect be saying that more than one school can meet their needs.

Many parents have a variety of social reasons for their children to attend a particular school – this may be due to location, existing friendship groups, childcare or the practicalities of your employment and routine. However these are not exceptional reasons – and for this reason very few applications are successfully considered as such.

Any needs identified may not be special educational needs as the admission of children on the basis of a special educational need is only for children with a Statement or Education, Health and Care Plan.

If you do not provide any additional information, your application will not be considered for exceptional social or medical reasons solely on the basis of your reasons in your application. If there are other medical reasons we should consider when processing your application, please let us know. You will not be informed before the normal offer day if applying for primary, junior or secondary school for the first time.



How were places allocated in previous years?







The tables in <u>Section E</u> of this guide include some admission statistics for previous admission years. This information may provide you with an indication of how places were allocated last year, but please note that this may not reflect preference and application trends for the current round of applications.



What are the policies for voluntary aided and academy schools?











The policies for admission to voluntary aided (VA) and academy schools are set by the governing body or academy trust of these schools. Information on which City of York schools are voluntary aided or academy schools, and which admission policy and oversubscription criteria applies is contained in <u>Section E</u> of this guide. In <u>Section C</u> of this guide you will find information on the oversubscription criteria and links to the admissions policies for our schools.



What happens if I apply late?



By the time we receive your application, your preferred school(s) may have filled all available places. For some schools this may be at the infant class size limit. We will then allocate you a place at the nearest alternative school with places available. This may be a school that is not your catchment school, or one some distance from your home address.



What happens if I don't apply for a school place?





If you don't apply by the deadline, we will write to you and ask you for some preferences. If you don't reply, we will allocate you a place at the nearest alternative school with places available after all other allocations have taken place. This may be a school that is not your catchment school, or one some distance from your home address.



What if my circumstances change before places are allocated?







If your circumstances (such as your address) change between the date of application and when places are allocated, please inform us immediately. If we can, we will take these changed circumstances into account, as long as the appropriate proof is provided prior to allocating places. Please email this proof to education@york.gov.uk Please note that changes in the month prior to Offer Day may not be able to be taken into account.



What if I have a change of preference before places are allocated?





If you would like to change your preferences after having made an application, we will take these into account if possible. All changes of preference need to be made in writing, preferably via email. For applications to start primary, infant or junior school we will not be able to accept changes for voluntary aided or academy schools, or schools in other local authority areas after 15 January. We will not be able to accept any changes after 15 March.



What if I have a change of preference before places are allocated?



All changes of preference need to be made in writing, preferably via email. For applications to start secondary school we will not be able to accept changes for voluntary aided or academy schools, or schools in other local authority areas after 31 December. We will not be able to accept any changes after 31 January.



I am moving to York – how do I apply for a place at infant, primary or junior school?







If you are moving to York after the primary application deadline, or in-year, we will work with you to find an available school place, taking both your preferences and the availability of places into account. Please note that in some cases, the school(s) of your preference may already be full. Where possible, we shall try and allocate a place at either your catchment school, or at a school local to your address. Most York primary schools have their own catchment area. Some schools may be full, and so allocating any additional pupils to the school would prejudice the education of other pupils already attending the school, or be in breach of infant class size legislation.



I am moving to York – how do I apply for a place at secondary school?





If you are moving to York after the secondary application deadline, or in-year, we will work with you to find an available school place, taking both your preferences and the availability of places into account. Please note that in some cases, the school(s) of your preference may already be full. Where possible, we shall try and allocate a place at either your catchment school, or at a school local to your address. The following York secondary schools have their own catchment area: Archbishop Holgate's CE School, Fulford School, Huntington School, Joseph Rowntree School, Millthorpe School, Vale of York Academy and York High School. Some schools may be full, and so allocating any additional pupils to the school would prejudice the education of other pupils already attending the school.



What if we are allocated a place at a school not of our preference?











We advise all parent/carers to express up to five preferences. In the event that a higher preference is not available, the school place allocated may be a lower preference. If no other preferences are made or can be offered, the allocated place may be the nearest alternative school with spaces available. This may not be the catchment school of the child if it is full.





For in-year applications we hold waiting lists that are based on the current circumstances of each child. We hold them for the current school year where any preference has been refused. Should a place become available and the school informs us, we will advise the school of the most entitled child to this place. After the end of the current school year, you should make a new application as waiting lists do not 'roll over' into future years.



Do you have waiting lists for schools?







If a school is oversubscribed, a waiting list will be held from when the allocations have been made until at least 31 December 2018 and after this, as an 'in-year' waiting list until the end of that school year. Your child's position on this list will be determined by the oversubscription criteria set out in the admissions policy for the school you are applying for. If your circumstances change, your position on the waiting list may also change, provided you have notified us of these changes in writing. If you want your child to be added to the waiting list for a voluntary aided or academy school, please also contact the school, who may require additional information. If you would like your child to be added to a waiting list please put this in writing to us.

Children who move into the York area after the allocation date and whose parent/carers have not previously applied for a York school, will be added to waiting lists in accordance with the relevant oversubscription criteria and their current circumstances.

If a place becomes available from a waiting list for your child, you will only have a short amount of time in which to decide to take up this place. If we cannot make contact with you regarding a place from a waiting list, we may proceed to the next child on the list. It is therefore, important you ensure we hold current contact details for you.

If a pupil does not take up an offer of a place at an oversubscribed school, this place will be offered to the next person on the list.

If you appeal for a place at a school, it does not affect your child's place on the waiting list.













Yes. You always have the right to appeal for a school, even if you did not originally express a preference for the school. However, you must have reasons for requesting this school, not reasons against the school you have been allocated. More Information on the appeals process is available in Section F of this guide.



I have heard a primary free school is opening in York. How can I find out more or apply?




In July 2016 the government approved plans for a new primary school for York specialising in the creative arts. Although the Creative Arts Academy York originally planned to be open for Reception class in September 2018, because of a delay in finding an appropriate site, York's first free school will now not open for Reception entry in 2018.

If you have been refused a place at a school of your preference, you have the right to appeal against the decision of the admission authority, for an Independent Appeal Panel to examine how places were allocated and whether you were refused in accordance with the admissions policy and procedure.

The following pages outline some information that you should consider before deciding to appeal, but if you require further guidance, please do not hesitate to contact us. We can never tell you if you should submit an appeal, only provide you with help and advice on the appeals process.

It is important to remember when appealing, that you are appealing for a place at your preferred school and not against the school your child has been allocated. You can appeal for a place at any school, even if it was not one you had originally applied for.



If you decide to submit an appeal you will be sent an appeal form relevant to the school and year group for which you are appealing, together with information about the appeals procedure. You should set out the reasons for your

appeal and return the form by the date requested.



All appeals are considered by an Independent Appeals Panel.

After submitting your appeal forms, which should include your reasons for wanting your child to attend your preferred school, the admissions authority will also submit papers detailing the reasons your child could not be allocated a place and why they do not believe that any additional children should be admitted. You will be provided with a full copy of all papers before the appeal hearing. These papers will contain the information on how places were allocated and why a place could not be offered to your child.

You may ask for further information that is relevant to your child's case prior to the appeal hearing but you should find that the admissions authority's papers provide these details.

The Panel will consider all of the information both you and the admissions authority submit, either in writing or in person at the appeal hearing. They will make a judgment based on both cases.

Decisions made by the panel are legally binding on both you and the admissions authority. The admissions authority may be the Local Authority, the Governing Body or the Academy Trust of the school.

The Clerk to the Independent Appeals
Panel is your key contact throughout the
process, is independent and plays no part
in decision making. The Clerk will write
to inform you of the panel's decision
within 5 school days after the appeal.

Appeals for Voluntary Aided or Academy schools may be organised separately by their respective governing bodies or academy trusts, although most schools use the central council process.



Upon receipt of your appeal forms, a date will be set at which a representative of the admissions authority will attend. If you choose not to attend the hearing, the case will be heard in your absence.

The Independent Appeals Panel will hear the case of the admissions authority first, followed by your case. There is the opportunity for both parties to ask questions before a decision is made.

There are two stages in deciding the outcome of a prejudice appeal:



First: a factual stage – The panel must decide whether 'prejudice to the provision of efficient education and use of resources' would arise were an extra child to be admitted to the school.

Second: a balancing stage – If the answer to the first stage is yes, then the panel must weigh the degree of prejudice and decide which case is stronger, the case of the admissions authority or your case.

You may only appeal once for each application – which is once each school year. A new appeal would only be considered if new evidence became available which could not have been made available at the original appeal hearing.



Infant Class Size Appeals

These appeals are different from the two stage prejudice appeals. Appeals for admission into a class which has reached the infant class size limit of 30 pupils with one teacher can only be upheld on very limited grounds.

These grounds are:

 that the child would have been offered a place if the admission arrangements had been properly implemented,

- that the child would have been offered a place if the arrangements had not been contrary to the mandatory provisions of the school admissions code and legislation, or
- that the decision was not one which a reasonable admissions authority would make in the circumstances of the case.

Because of these limited grounds, it is less likely that an infant class size appeal will be successful.

This section includes Free School Meals, Assistance with School Uniform and the Pupil Premium.

Assistance is available to pupils from some low income families who meet certain low income criteria as well as free school meals to all infants.

Schools can also benefit by claiming additional funding through the Pupil Premium.



Free School Meals for low income families

Children from low income families may be entitled to receive free school meals, if their parents/carers receive one of the following income related benefits:

- Universal Credit*;
- Income Support;
- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance;
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance;
- Guarantee element of State Pension Credit;

- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999; or
- Child Tax Credit, but not receiving any Working Tax Credit and where your annual household income (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs) is less than £16,190*

Parent/carers who receive Working Tax Credit may be entitled only during the four-week period immediately after their employment finishes or after they start to work less than 16 hours per week – this is known as the 'four week run on period', and parent/carers will not be entitled after this time

Free school meals are available at all schools, and applications are treated in confidence.

Universal Infant Free School Meals

All children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are now entitled to claim a free school meal, regardless of whether their

parent/carer is on a low income. Meals are available to all pupils but will not continue into Year 3.



The Pupil Premium

Schools may now claim additional funding for some pupils if they meet one of the following criteria:

- pupils in primary, infant or junior school who have been entitled to Free School Meals on the basis of a low income in the past 6 years – currently £1320 per pupil;
- pupils in secondary school who have been entitled to Free School Meals on the basis of a low income in the past 6 years – currently £935 per pupil;
- looked after pupils currently £1900 per pupil;
- previously looked after pupils such as those adopted from care—currently £1900 per pupil;
- pupils from service families currently £300 per pupil;

Given schools benefit from additional funding for these categories of pupils, it is important that schools know and can record that your child meets one of the above criteria.

If your child is entitled to universal infant free school meals but you think you may be eligible on the basis of your low income, we ask that you still apply so your child's school can benefit from this additional funding as well as your child's meals continuing uninterrupted into Year 3.

Schools can spend pupil premium for the educational benefit of pupils registered at that school, or on community facilities which benefit pupils at the school, their families, or people who live and work in the local area.



Free School Meals for Year 12 and Year 13 pupils

Once a pupil who is eligible for Free School Meals reaches the end of Year 11, they may continue to receive a free school meal if they are attending a school with a sixth form without making a new application. Meals will continue uninterrupted.

For students going on to study at a college such as Askham Bryan or York College, free school meals may be still claimed, although a new application to the college must be made before meals can start.



Pupils who are starting years 7, 8, 9, or 10 in September 2018 may be entitled to some assistance with the costs of purchasing school uniform if they are receiving, or eligible to receive free school meals.

Assistance is only available from us to York resident pupils attending nonacademy secondary schools. If your child attends an academy you should enquire directly as to the support they may offer.

Please note assistance is not available for children starting Year 11, or children at primary school.

Vouchers are usually issued in June. You do not need to apply for this assistance as it is automatically issued.

In 2017 the value of the voucher was £70 for Year 7 pupils and £40 for other pupils. Vouchers issued can be spent only with the dedicated uniform supplier for your child's school. Please be aware that the voucher is not transferable.

Pupils are assessed for free home to school transport when they are allocated a school place. If we think your child is eligible we will arrange for our transport providers to contact you to arrange for transport to start.

Assistance will be provided for children who are eligible under the home to school transport policy. All distances measured from home to school are measured by the shortest walking route, which is the same measurement used in allocating school places.

Please note that most assistance depends on whether your child attends their catchment school – that is the school serving the local area in which your child lives. The home address must be the address at which the pupil is ordinarily resident for the majority of the school week. The following pages outline some examples of how pupils may be eligible for some assistance.



Primary school pupils are eligible for free transport if:

- they live more than 2 miles from, and are attending their catchment school; or
- they live more than 2 miles from and are attending their nearest suitable school preferred on the grounds of religion or belief and are eligible for free school meals under the low income criteria or in receipt of their maximum level of working tax credit.

Secondary school pupils are eligible for free transport if:

- they live more than 3 miles from, and are attending, their catchment school, or
- they are entitled to free school meals or their parent/carers are in receipt of their maximum level of working tax credit and are attending either:
- a. one of their 3 nearest schools where that school is between 2 and 6 miles away from their home address, or
- b. the nearest school preferred on the grounds of religion or belief, where they were allocated a place on this basis, and their home is between 2 and 15 miles from that school.



The policy for providing home to school transport on denominational grounds was changed from September 2013.

New pupils are no longer automatically entitled to any assistance unless they meet the low income criteria in the guidance above.



Students who are aged 16-19 and at school or college may be eligible for assistance with transport if they meet certain criteria. These criteria are the distance between home and school/college, their age when they started the course, whether the school or college is the nearest to offer the chosen course(s), and are on or from a family on a low income.

Assistance is means-tested, and the policy is reviewed each year. Application forms are available in June for starting in September.

Early Education entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds

All 3 and 4 year olds are entitled to up to 15 hours of free early education entitlement funded by the Local Authority. Children may take up a free place with the following types of providers;

- at a nursery class attached to a local school,
- at St Paul's Nursery School,
- at a pre-school playgroup,
- at a private day nursery or independent nursery school,
- with a child minder (who is registered to deliver funded places),

Working parents/carers of 3 and 4 year olds may also be eligible for a further 15 hours extended entitlement in addition to the existing free 15 hours early education entitlement, if they meet certain eligibility criteria.

Delayed Entry

Delayed Entry means that parent/carers may secure a place at a school under the normal admission arrangements but choose to postpone their child's admission until the start of the school term after the child turns five. It is a legal requirement that all children must enter

formal full time education the term after their fifth birthday.

Entry can only be delayed within the same year group, for example starting in Reception later than September at Christmas or Easter. If your child was born after 01 April you could delay to September, though this would be to start Year 1, and not Reception.

If you are interested in this and think this may be the best option for your child, speak to your allocated school after Offer Day.

Deferred Entry

Requesting to defer entry is to request to postpone your child starting school until the following school year group, to start Reception one year later than your child's age-related peers.

Only parent/carers of summer born children, who are born after 01 April may request to defer entry.

If you are interested in this option for your child, you will still need to apply at the normal time, and submit a formal request in writing detailing your reasons for requesting a deferral, including all reasons and if available, what evidence you wish to be considered when the admissions authority makes a decision.

You may wish to consider the long term implications of deferring entry, including your child being out of step with their peers and that years cannot be 'skipped' later.



Wraparound Care

Schools and other local providers work in their Shared Foundation Partnerships to offer early education and wraparound care and, subject to consultation, extended services to suit each child.

Each local partnership may include preschool playgroups, day nurseries, child minders, toddler groups and other out-of-school care.

Every three and four year old (and five year olds who are not in formal full time education) are entitled to up to 15 hours of free early years provision per week (children who are accessing full time education will be receiving the equivalent of 15 hours per week), and there may

also be the opportunity to access additional wraparound care..

Wraparound care is the term used to describe seamless care, education and play for young children. This includes breakfast clubs, lunch clubs, before/after early education sessions, after school clubs, homework clubs, holiday play schemes and child minders.



We provide advice and support to preschool children with additional needs, their families and Early Years Settings. We are involved from the point of identification of a child's difficulties or vulnerabilities, until the child starts school - or earlier if they are no longer experiencing difficulties or no longer require early intervention.

The team includes Early Years
Educational Psychology, Early Support
Co-ordinator, Portage, Portage Home
Visitors and Specialist Early Years
Teachers.







We work to try to meet the needs of as many pupils as possible within mainstream schools. To help with this, we provide a number of support services, which work together with schools and teachers to meet the needs of all pupils.

Specialist Teaching Team

We also offer specialist support in liaison with FE and HE providers to YP accessing education after school.

EPs also work directly with CYP, in partnership with parents/carers and staff, offering specialist assessments in a variety of educational settings. For CYP with complex special educational needs, who have an Education, Health and Care Plan in place, EPs have statutory duties to monitor progress and provision up to the age of 25 years, if the CYP remains in education or training.





York SENDIASS is a free 'arms length' service provided by the Local Authority to offer specialist advice, guidance, support and information to children, young people and parents covering educational needs (SEN), disability, health and social care. The Service provides neutral and factual support and information on special educational needs system to help children, their parents and young people to play an active and informed role in their education and care.

- Information on Health and Social Care policies and procedures
- Support with transition at each educational stage
- Preparation and support for SEND Tribunals
- Support communicating with professionals e.g. writing letters, emails and telephone calls
- Support to achieve positive outcomes at meetings and reviews about your child
- Help to ensure your views, and the views of your child, are heard and taken into consideration
- Help in understanding professional reports, as well as making sense of the letters and documents you receive
- Signposting to other support services




